

About Q Ranch

Q Ranch is a secluded historic ranch nestled under the Mogollon Rim near Young, Arizona among tall pines and open meadows. It is accessed via unpaved roads. The ranch dates from 1894 and played a significant role in the Pleasant Valley War. Many historic buildings are still in use today and a large prehistoric pueblo is located near the lodge. Q Ranch was once the largest cattle ranch in Arizona, encompassing 360 square miles. It currently consists of 600 acres surrounded by the Tonto National Forest. It is located at an elevation of 5600 feet and provides a cool summer escape from the big city hustle and bustle. The rich habitat is home to 10 large and a

host of smaller mammal species, more than 150 bird, 50 butterfly and 12 dragonfly species (and counting). We have yet to inventory the flora!




Q Ranch is a cell phone dead zone. Nearest signal, depending on your provider, is 2-12 miles. There is wi-fi in the lodge. Due to bandwidth limitations, guests with laptops are asked to confine use to email only. Upstairs rooms require climbing one flight of steps. There is no air-conditioning or refrigeration; daytime temps rarely reach discomfort levels and nights are always cool. If this is your first visit, you should not attempt driving there in the dark. High-clearance vehicles are best for negotiating the roads; four-wheel drive is not required. AAS Field School

The Q Ranch Archaeological Program, as part of the Arizona Archaeological Society (AAS), is pleased to offer a Scientific Illustration



Workshop taught by Dr. John W. Hohmann and Bryan Donahue, professional artist and scientific illustrator. Students will learn the importance and value of scientific illustration and have the opportunity to illustrate artifacts and cultural features from Q Ranch. The goals of this workshop are to:

- 1. learn basic scientific illustration techniques;
- 2. produce an accurate and detailed record of an archaeological artifact;
- 3. learn more about the artifact itself through such careful examination, and;
- 4. inform others about the intricacies of an artifact through detailed illustration that cannot be as easily conveyed through words or photographs.

Dr. John Hohmann has over 39 years of professional archaeological experience. He has been the Director and Senior Principal Investigator at the AAS Q Ranch Archaeological Program for the past 26 years. Dr. Hohmann has published numerous excavation reports where various scientific illustrations were used and will share such experiences with the workshop participants.

Mr. Brian Donahue received his degree from the University of Arizona in Studio Art with an emphasis in Scientific Illustration. Before becoming a highly successful sculptor and artist, Mr. Donahue worked as a scientific illustrator at numerous institutions, consulting archaeological firms, and for the US military. These include the Arizona State Museum, the Archaeological Research Center—Hawaii, the US Air Force and the US Army. Hohmann and Donahue met at the U of A



and began their first work together in archaeology and scientific illustration at the Arizona State Museum. Hohmann and Donahue will be assisted by Ms. Peg Davis, staff archaeologist, and Mr. Ron Winters, staff archaeologist and illustrator.

The workshop is limited to ten students, with a minimum of six students. All students must sign an indemnification and liability waiver. Participants will stay at the Q Ranch Lodge and during free time, may enjoy additional sketching opportunities of the picturesque ranch, prehistoric ruin, and surrounding scenery.

Dates & Fees

Arrive after 2pm Sunday, July 28 and depart after breakfast on Saturday, Aug. 3 (5 days class work, 6 nights lodging).

The cost is \$895 per person (shared room) or \$1150 per person (single occupancy). This includes lodging, meals and course registration fees.

Other Things to Do

A lodge stay offers solitude and the opportunity to view the flora and fauna, hike, explore ancient archaeological sites or relax and enjoy quiet meditation in the cool pines. The small ranching community of Young lies 20 miles to the west. It was the site of the infamous Pleasant Valley War, the longest and bloodiest range war in American history. The remote location and lack of light pollution afford naked-eye viewing of the Milky Way.
